


## **LABOUR ROOMS / DELIVERY SUITES**

# Continuous Quality and Safety Improvement in Federal Tertiary Hospital

#### **Labour Room and Delivery Suite**

The labour room is one of the most versatile rooms in a hospital. It is called a labour, delivery, and recovery room (LDR). This is the type of room that some hospitals and almost all birth centers use for their care. Once a client placed in a room, this is the room that she will use for labour and birth, including the initial hours of recovery.

The LDR is designed for nearly all births. It can handle a birth for women choosing to go unmedicated or those who wish to have an epidural. The vast majority of these rooms can also handle minor emergencies and procedures including forceps and vacuum deliveries. You would only need to leave this room if you needed to go to the operating room for a cesarean or the high potential of a cesarean (such as in the cases of twin births or a vaginal breech birth attempt).

Once the baby is born, there is equipment in the room to handle newborn care as well. While the immediate care of the newborn is best-handled skin to skin with the mother, if there were an emergency or the need for specialized equipment, the average LDR room is prepared with a warmer for the baby and life-saving resuscitation equipment. You will stay in this room the first hour or two after you give birth, then you are transferred to the postpartum floor.

Reduction in maternal and neonatal mortality is one of the strategic objectives of the Federal Ministry of Health, in the light of persistent high maternal and neonatal mortality rates. It is therefore imperative for continuous efforts by Federal tertiary hospitals to improve the quality of care given to mother and child during delivery and immediate postnatal care.

### **Objectives of this Checklist**

This quality assessment checklist will provide **direction**, **support**, and **accountability framework** while focussing on individuals, systems, management of resources and self-governance. It will build corporate accountability for clinical performance into the labour, delivery and recovery care management model and develop a corporate culture in which quality improvement becomes a shared enterprise through shared learning and information. It will also provide strategic opportunities to diagnose and repair broken processes.

Frequent, accurate assessment and timely feedback will support action plans to implement systems that are lacking and revive those that are not functioning effectively.

This checklist therefore represents a clinical governance assessment tool to determine:

- The level and quality of the services, resources and operational policies.
- The capacity of the staff to provide safe and quality care
- The level of process capabilities
- Key drivers of quality and patients' satisfaction in a strategic plan.
- The competency level of clinical and non –clinical support services in the labour room /delivery suites.
- Areas for improvement.





#### **Assessment Scoring**

The contents of this checklist have been awarded point values based on their relative importance. Responses to all questions must be either "Yes" or "No" or "Not Applicable" (NA).

The checklist has considerable overlap and expanded to include important continuous quality tools.

#### NOTE:

- Only responses marked yes should be given the allotted points. All the required answers to a particular question must be present before you can indicate a "yes" for any given checklist question and then award the corresponding allotted points.
- It is often not necessary to ask all the checklist questions verbatim. An experienced auditor can often learn to answer multiple checklist questions through open-ended questions with the key or designated staff contact.

This checklist is divided into different aspects of Quality Management System that the department is required to develop and implement regularly as listed below:
